Dear friends,

My name is Amelia and I have three children. My family makes a living by growing vegetables and this allows us to survive.

In our village, we help each other. If someone is lacking food, we share what we have so that we don't die of hunger.

I didn't always live in this village; we left our previous home because there were a lot of droughts, and we only had a small piece of land. I thought it would be better to move so at least my family would be fed.

When I was young, it would rain a lot and we had a bumper harvest. Then

things changed. When we moved, we didn't have any money for transport, so we carried all our belongings on our heads and our backs.

In our new village we learned about conservation farming through Christian Care and they taught us how to successfully grow crops. They shared with me that when you make planting stations, this allows the water to accumulate. The crops then grow really well!

Christian Care also taught us how to rear chickens. When there are plenty, you can sell them and send your children to school, buy food to eat, and purchase clothes to wear.

Christian Care is supporting us through other projects, they are helping us rehabilitate the wetlands. We have a group of fish at the wetlands, and we now also make a living by selling the fish. I use the money to buy materials that I need in my home.


I've found that if I follow what I have learnt from Christian Care, I won't struggle. But, if I do my own thing, it will fail, and I will have to start over and move from one place to another.

I joined Christian Care for my children. I now show them how to dig planting stations and use conservation farming to grow crops.

I hope that my children will have good jobs and be well fed. If they have good jobs, they can support their families and themselves.

Christian Care is wonderful, and we have learnt a lot. We can see that there is a difference and going forward we will do even better than what we started with.
